

## Spotlight on Louisville | Breakthrough innovation

**Louisville's innovation strategy aims to co-create breakthroughs for urgent challenges through an equity lens.** The city has leveraged the existing data in the city's stat program, LouieStat, and in their open data portal. A Data Governance Committee comprised of representatives from all agencies has been created to work on breakthrough innovations using data. Furthermore, Louisville has developed the Open Government Coalition to help other cities take advantage of private sector data sharing agreements and deploy pre-built solutions to make the data actionable.

## Vision and approach to innovation capacity

### The city's innovation strategy

Along with 44% of cities surveyed, Louisville has an **explicit innovation strategy**.

The city most closely associates innovation capacity with the following terms:

### Approaches to innovation capacity

Similar to 24% of cities surveyed, Louisville approaches innovation from a **holistic/macro level**.

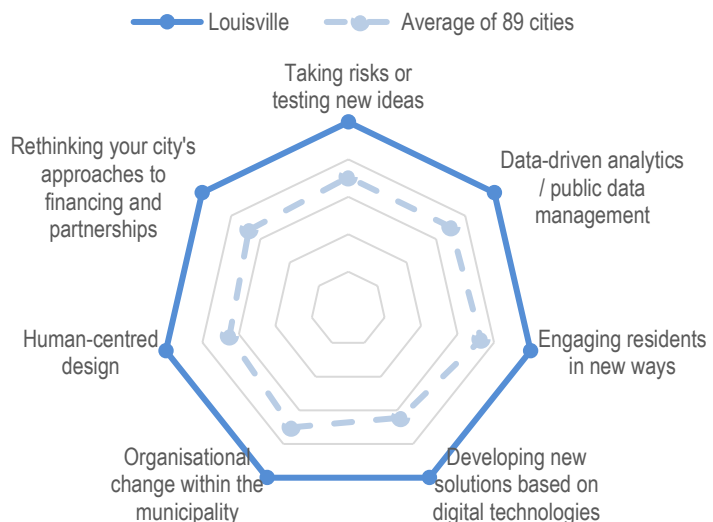
The **top two priority policy areas** for the city's innovation work include:

### Most common innovation activities

Louisville's innovation activity includes various kinds of activities including **taking risks and testing new ideas; facilitating data-driven analytics; engaging residents in new ways; developing new solutions based on digital technologies; facilitating organisational change within the municipal administration; human-centred design; and rethinking the city's approach to financing and partnerships.**



## Funding for innovation capacity

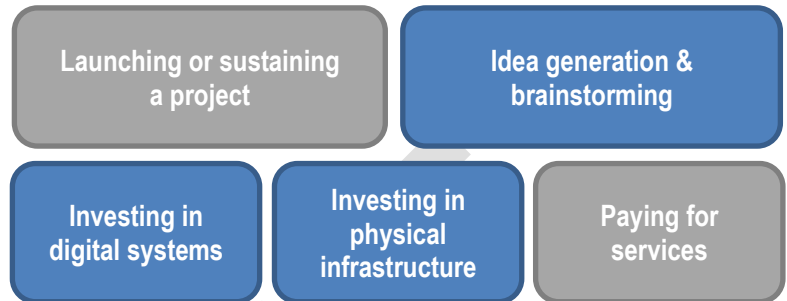
### Funding to support innovation capacity

Like 77% of cities surveyed, Louisville has dedicated funding to support innovation capacity, which originates from the following sources:

- ✓ **Municipal budget**  
(city council approved funds/operating budget)
- ✓ **External funding**  
(private/philanthropy/non-profit)

### Types of activities being funded

Louisville's funding for innovation capacity is generally directed towards **generating ideas & brainstorming**, which is one of the two most commonly funded activities among all cities surveyed. Louisville also **invests in digital systems and physical infrastructure**.



## Organisational structure & staffing



Louisville's dedicated team for innovation consists of **5 staff** in the Office of Civic Innovation.

Staff skills and profiles include:

- ✓ **Data scientist**
- ✓ **Engineer**
- ✓ **Project manager**
- ✓ **Community engagement staff**

## Partnerships for innovation & data



Louisville has developed partnerships to promote its innovation capacity with **other public agencies, private firms, not-for-profit organisations, and city residents/resident associations**.

To improve data use, the city has also developed **data partnerships with the private sector, academia, think tanks, and philanthropy** to collect and analyse data, as well as **with other cities**.
